Alumni Profile: Bob Buckler

Many Thespians are not theatre majors, let along continue with theatre for the rest of their careers. However, there are a few including Bob Buckler, Penn State Class of 1968.

As a Penn State Thespian, Bob worked as a draftsman areas of technical theatre. on Brigadoon but was noted for his costumes. He His designed costumes for "Guys and Dolls" which cast other successful theatre professionals including a future Grammy winner and a dancer who went on to create the Jazz Nutcracker at Point Park University. Bob's costumes were memorable. One of the most memorable for him was the Hot Box chorus girls who wore hot pink outfits for "Take Back Your Mink." His final work with Kellerman, and Danny Thespians was set designer

for West Side Story.

After leaving Penn State, Bob did one semester of graduate study at Boston University in design. He then embarked on his professional career of more than 30 years in various

Bob did one season of summer stock in Hampton, New Hampshire. He then moved to Philadelphia where he recalls sleeping on fellow Thespian Barbara Schwab's couch in Center City. He was hired at the Theatre of the Living Arts as technical director for the 1969-70 season, which turned out to be their last one. That season gave Bob the opportunity to work with such people as Judd Hirsch, Morgan Freeman, Sally DeVito... in their much

younger days. Bob recalled one show in particular where Danny played the family dog and Bob built his doghouse.

While he "kicked around" Philadelphia for a few years doing odd jobs, even selling falafel in the square, he received a call from the producers of Living Arts. He was offered a position to go on tour with the Acting Company from Julliard for 1973. That year he ended up back in New York on Broadway with Patty Lupone, Kevin Kline, and David Ogden Stiers. Years later, Bob would end his Broadway career with Patty Lupone, loading in for Gypsy. He considers her one of the finest actresses of our time.

In between, he served as technical director of the Manhattan Theatre Club, Off Off Broadway, for 3 seasons. Then there was a stretch of working in scene shops. In 1981, he started at the Metropolitan Opera scene shop building scenery to a scale "like no other in legitimate theatre."

Next, Bob followed a couple of carpenters to Hudson Scenic Studios in

the Bronx where he worked from 1984 to 1991 building scenery for Broadway shows, displays, and industrials. The owners were friends of Robin Wagner and built all of his Broadway shows. Bob worked on the original sets of *Les* Miserables, The Phantom of the Opera, and Miss Saigon. For Les Miz, he worked on the original stage turntable of wood, then later built the metal replacement. He also worked on the turntables for all the tours, eventually building more turntables than there were companies. Since he was good at details, he built the overhead sewer grates for Les Miz, then the chandelier and throne for *Phantom*. He drilled approximately 3,400 holes in the chandelier for the crystals. And he built the Phantom's throne completely by himself including the mechanics of it and shopping for the parts, woodwork, trim, and so forth... all but the sculptural details, that's a different union. Bob also built the nearly full stage banister for the Masquerade staircase.

In 1991. Bob went to work on Broadway as part of the running crew for Crazy For You and spent 18 years on the Great White Way. Shows he worked included Disney's Beauty and the Beast, The King and I with Lou Diamond Philips, and A Christmas Carol at Madison Square Garden. And he worked props for the entire run of Mel Brooks' The Producers. When he was not working full time, he would fill in on other shows. Bob was asked to take over props for Sunset Boulevard the week it was announced the show was closing.

It may have been his work, but Bob recalls that working on Crazy For You and The Producers was like going to a party 8 times a week, with fun casts, crew, and staff. He says that Mel Brooks is a truly nice, generous person who came up through the ranks and has not forgotten that.

Outside of theatre, Bob worked on the

original set for Saturday Night Live, he built the chairs on the big round base of the set. He also recalls working at a small dinner theatre where they finished building the set during the performance of Act One.

Now retired and living in the Pittsburgh area, when Thespians presented *The Producers* in the fall of 2012, Bob travelled to Penn State for the dress rehearsal and talked with the cast and crew about his experiences with the original production.

He also offers this bit of wisdom learned from Broadway even older old timers..."if it hangs down, it's scenery, if it hangs up, it's props".

Big changes are happening at Schwab. The building is closed and the \$1.5 million renovation work is in full swing.
